MINUTES OF THE

NOTTINGHAM TOWN MEETING

March 11, 1969 — Nottingham, New Hampshire

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

Selectman	Frank Spofford
Town Clerk	Florence Arthur
Treasurer	Evelyn Glover
Tax Collector	Donald Perkins
Library Trustee	Dorothy Garvin, 3 yrs.
Trustee of Trust Funds	Thomas Fernald, 3 yrs.
Road Agent	Herbert Smith
Auditors	J. Leo Ash & Chester Batchelder

The articles 2-15, were voted on at Town Hall Saturday, March 15, 1969 at 2 p.m.

- ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for same. Moved by Frederick York, seconded by John Clark. Passed in affirm.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,055.84, the State to contribute \$7,038.95 for Town road aid. Moved the motion to be accepted as read. Passed in affiirm.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for control of White Blister Rust. Moved by James Kelsey, seconded by Elinor Fernald. Passed in affirm.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to join the Rural District Health Council and to raise and appropriate the sum

of \$811.00 in support of this organization Visiting Nurses Services and that the selectmen be authorized to appoint two representatives to the Rural District Health Council. Moved and passed in the affirm.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a Fire Truck for a sum not to exceed \$6000.00, and raise and appropriate \$2000.00 this year and issue two (2) serial notes of \$2000.00 each, payable each of the two ensuing years, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and sign said notes. Moved by Mr. Rourke, seconded by John Perkins. Secret ballot taken. Yes 104, No 32. Passed affirm.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800.00 for new equipment and other needs for Police Department. This article was voted to be tabled. Ballot Yes 83, No 53. 136 votes cast.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to tar and sealcoat roads. Moved by Philip Fernald, seconded by John Perkins. Passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to purchase two (2) culverts, one for Kennard Rd. and one for Smoke St. for the sum of \$7,000.00 to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00 this year and to issue three (3) serial notes of \$2,000.00 each, payable each of the ensuing years, and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and sign notes. Moved by Donald Perkins that article be accepted as read. Secret ballot taken. Yes 97, No 28, 125 votes cast. Passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to purchase a truck for the Highway Department, for a sum not to exceed \$7,500.00, to raise and appropriate \$1,500.00 this year and to issue three (3) serial notes of \$2,000.00 each, payable each of the three ensuing years, and to authorize the

Selectmen to issue and sign said notes. Frederick Fernald moved the article to be accepted as read. Secret ballot taken, Yes 113, No 15. Passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to improve the town beach at Drownes Dam. Moved by Sam Richardson the article be accepted as read. Seconded and passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to partially remodel the Town Hall at a cost not to exceed \$6,800.00. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 this year and to issue six (6) serial notes, one for \$800.00 payable one year from date of issue and five (5) notes for \$1,000.00 each, payable each of the five ensuing years and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and sign said notes. The article was amended by Mr. Rourke to read; to raise \$2,000.00 for improvements to Town Hall. Passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of taxes. Moved and passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collectors Deeds and to sell surplus equipment at public auction. Moved and seconded. Passed in affirm.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before meeting.

It was moved by Donald Perkins that the Selectmen appoint all Town Police officers. Passed in affirm.

It was moved by Mr. Rourke the Selectmen be instructed to buy new truck without trade in. Negative vote.

It was moved the moderator appoint a committee of 5 to look into Bicentennial celebration and report.

Discussion followed regarding Police Department. Philip Fernald related and compared budgets of other towns of our size, then increased raise in funds over the years. Purpose of Police Department appropriations discussed.

It was moved by Mr. Rourke the budget for Police Department be cut from \$6,000 to \$4,000. Mr. John Regan suggested the department make a statement as to reason and cause for raise in Police Department. It was moved that a secret ballot be taken to cut Police Department budget from \$6,000.00 to \$4,00.00. Yes 96, No 54. Amendment carried.

Mr. Rourke made motion to keep dump open 24 hours a day. Amendment by Delmar McDermott to keep as of past year and \$1,600.00 be appropriated for care. Motion carried and passed in affirm.

It was moved by Frederick York for Town to discontinue to plow driveways. Amendment made by George Pritchard to plow a driveway in case of emergency, elderly or ill. Voted on and passed in affirm. "To plow no driveways, not including camp roads. (Camp roads are not considered driveways.") The Selectmen to determine "What an emergency is."

Motion made to increase General Upkeep of Highway from \$3,000.00 to \$5,000.00.

Back to Article 7. Motion made to amend Article 7 to read Article 7 "and other needs of department." Moved by Philip Fernald for secret ballot. Mr. Rourke moved Article 7 be tabled. Secret ballot. Yes 83, No 53. Article tabled.

It was moved the Town Meeting for 1970 be held on Saturday following Town Meeting day and to be held in Fire House. Meeting adjourned.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Nottingham in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Nottingham on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,209.61, the State to contribute \$8,064.06 for Town Road Aid.
- 4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$829.00 in support of The Rural District Health Council, Inc., Visiting Nurse Services.
- 6. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,250.00 for new fire hose and accessories for the Fire Department.

- 7. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to repair and replace fences of Town Cemeteries.
- 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to tar and sealcoat roads.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote an additional sum of \$5,500.00 for the construction of the Rte. 152 bridge at the Center, increasing the Town's share to \$22,500.00 and the State to contribute \$90,000.00. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 this year, and to raise four (4) serial notes for \$1,000.00 each, payable each of the ensuing years, and to authorize the Selectmen to sign said notes.
- 10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to improve the Town Beach at Drowne's Dam.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to construct quarters for Town Offices at a cost not to exceed \$5,000.00; to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 this year and to issue four (4) serial notes for \$1,000.00 each, payable each of the four ensuing years, and authorize the Selectmen to issue and sign said notes.
- 12. To see if the Town will establish a Town Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36-a, of conservation minded members to be appointed by the Board of Selectmen within sixty days of passage of this article. The first named member shall serve as temporary chairman to call the Commission together for its first meeting. (By Petition)

- To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to tar the Mountain Road hill, below the State Park entrance. (By Petition)
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to sell the North River Dam and Dam Site to the State of New Hampshire Water Resources Board (R.S.A. 482-D) for the sum of thirty-eight cents (38c). This being the Town of Nottingham proportion of the \$1.00 consideration; and to authorize the Selectmen to execute all necessary transactions.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to increase the building permit fees from the sum of \$1.00 to the sum of \$5.00.
- 16. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow in anticipation of Taxes.
- 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired through Tax Collector's deeds and to sell surplus equipment at public auction.
- 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

ARTICLE 1 will be acted upon TUESDAY, MARCH 10th, 10:00 A.M. - 6:00 P.M.

ARTICLES 2 through 18 will be acted upon SATURDAY, MARCH 14, at 2:00 P.M.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Less fortunate than our northern towns, we had too many fires. Carelessness in burning trash and discarding smoking material and children playing with fire caused most of the fires. Your Forest Fire Warden's job would be easier if everyone understood the State laws that govern the kindling of outdoor fires. A synopsis of these laws follow:

Fire Permit

A fire permit is needed for all outdoor fires in or near woodland anytime the ground is not covered with snow. This includes household waste burning, even if in an incinerator, grass burning, garden trash as well as brush burning. Such burning is restricted by regulation to be prior to 9:00 a.m. and after 5:00 p.m.

Exceptions

Commercial or industrial burning is allowed anytime under normal conditions with permission of the District Chief and a permit from the Fire Warden.

Camp or cooking fires are allowed on your own property with permission of the Fire Warden. On another's property with written permission of the landowner and permission of the Fire Warden. The warden can forbit such fires if in a hazardous area. Permits for cooking fires in the White Mountain National Forest can be obtained from the Laconia Office or at the Ranger Stations. Permits are not required in public camp or picnic grounds where fireplaces have been built for this purpose.

Penalties

1. For kindling a fire without a permit. Maximum of

\$200.00 fine; or imprisonment for not more than 60 days.

- 2. For kindling a fire by any means wilfully or recklessly that shall endanger woodlands the maximum fine is \$500.00 or one year's imprisonment.
- 3. For failure to totally extinguish a comp or cooking fire before leaving it the same penalties as in (1) above.
- 4. For dropping inflammable material in or near woodland, maximum fine is \$25.00.

Fire prevention is a personal matter and a good habit. Keep our town free from smokes in 1970.

REPORT OF CHIEF OF POLICE

The following report of activities is hereby submitted by the Nottingham Chief of Police for the year ending December 31, 1969.

I would like to express my appreciation to Officers Benjamin DeButts and Richard Emond for the services rendered the Town and the Department throughout the past year.

During the past year we answered approximately 312 complaints.

- 11 automobile accidents were investigated of which 1 was a fatality.
- 21 breaks; 2 stolen automobiles; 1 stolen mini-bike; 2 ski-mobile incidents; 1 shooting incident; 1 hit and run; 1 rape; and 5 acts of vandalism were reported.
- 23 dog complaints were answered and 1 dog was buried by the department.
- 2 missing, lost or wanted persons were located, and 2 assists to motorists were rendered.

3 emergency messages and several other miscellaneous messages were delivered.

We assisted other Departments 5 times and on several occasions worked with the Sheriff's Department and the State Police and also attended court regularly.

I would like to remind the people of this community that the Police Department is seldom thought of except until a time of crisis or emergency. Realizing this Town does not have a full-time Department I hope everyone realizes we are not and cannot be available at all times, but try to be available 95 percent of the time.

Being this is the first year doing police work we realize we have not been as efficient as veteran police officers, but we are scheduled and have already attended several training courses.

A total of 1,210 man hours were utilized in providing police coverage to the town this year and a total of 11,357 miles were traveled throughout the town in the performance of police duties and because of this patrolling, I feel the crime rate is on the decline.

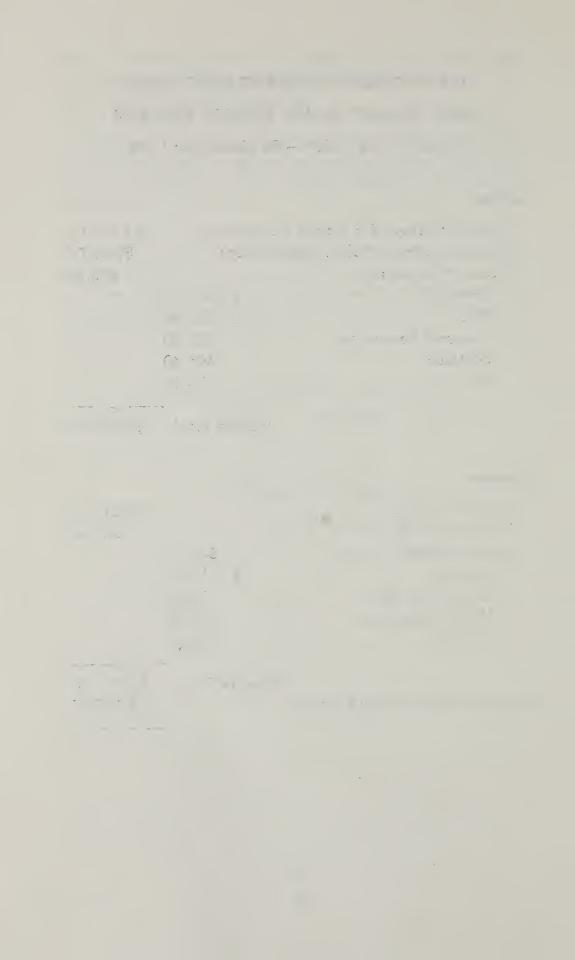

The New Hampshire State Board of Education has recently approved new minimum standards for the elementary schools of the state. This has many implications for the Epsom School District. The local district must develop a plan for the implementation of these new standards no later than September 1, 1972. However, for districts planning a building program, this program must include spaces to meet the requirements of the standards now. If not, the State Department of Education will not approve these plans. This approval is necessary in order to make the district eligible for state building aid.

In the following paragraphs, an attempt has been made to summarize these standards in order that the Board and the District will be informed as far in advance as possible.

The pupil teacher ratio in grades 1 and 2 must be 25 to 1 or less; in grades above the first and second, 30 to 1, or less.

Each elementary school must add to its offerings, if it has not already done so, the following subjects: art, health, music, and physical education. It must also provide services in the fields of library, guidance, and health. The district must make provisions for special education. If the district maintains a middle school or a junior high school, it must furnish opportunities in industrial arts and in home economics.

Each school must provide library services with a certified librarian available. For schools of 150 to 300 children, there must be 1,000 square feet of library space available; for enrollments of 300 to 500, it must have 2,000 square feet. The basic book collection must include 6,000 books. The annual budget must include an amount of money equal to \$5.00 per pupil to be expended annually for library purposes.

When attempting to meet the building standards for

elementary schools, the following must be considered. Sites for elementary schools must be at least five acres in size, plus one acre for each 100 pupils. A 300 pupil elementary school, therefore, would require eight acres for site. Each classroom, when new construction is undertaken, must include at least 900 square feet, or 30 square feet per pupil.

In regard to the professional staff, all staff members must be certified by the teacher certification office of the State Department of Education.

Other staffing requirements are as follows:

The principal must be employed on a full time basis in schools with an enrollment of 300, on a half time basis for schools with less enrollment.

There must be a school secretary for schools with an enrollment of 300 or more.

The above summary, of course, does not include all of the details of the newly established standards, but does indicate some of the main things which must be considered in any long range planning. The immediate conclusion is that this will cost money for equipment, for materials, for building expansion or renovations, and staffing.

It would seem to the undersigned that if these standards are to be met by the local districts, there must be a change in the present method of financing education in New Hampshire. It does not seem fair to add this additional burden to the presently used property tax base.

As directed by the voters at the last annual meeting, your school board has explored the feasibility of contracting with some of the surrounding communities an Authorized Regional Enrollment Area agreement. The first step in such negotiation is an article in the school warrant to formally elect or appoint a committee to represent the district.

Advantages of the AREA concept are many, some of which are outlined below:

- 1. Is assurance of a "high school" or other school organization for an extended period of time.
- 2. Assurance of a tuition rate based on the conditions outlined in the Written Plan.
 - 3. May provide significant educational benefits by a more permanent association between districts.
 - 4. Provides state incentive aid which is credited according to the Written Plan.

In closing, this office would like to express its appreciation for the cooperation received from the citizens, school board, staff and children of the school district.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

This report covering the year beginning July 1968 and ending July 1969, saw the Nottingham School Board with no major problems, only routine school board business.

In the spring and summer, we hired four new teachers to fill vacancies of leaving teachers.

In the fall, Mrs. Catherine McDermott resigned from the Nottingham School Board to serve as a teacher's aid at our Nottingham Elementary School. Richard Bengston was selected to fill out the rest of the year on the board.

At the end of the year, the members of the Nottingham School Board began consulting with high schools in the area to find out if they would take our students, Grades 7-12. We have made a detailed report of this.

REPORT OF FINDINGS OF NOTTINGHAM SCHOOL BOARD

This report is the Nottingham School Board's findings after looking into a long range area school agreement with surrounding Districts, to accept our students, Grades 7-12.

The school Districts contacted through the Superintendent's office are: Epping, Raymond, Coe-Brown (Northwood), Rochester, Dover, and Oyster River (Durham).

The replies received from each individual district are as follows:

Epping — Definately Not Interested

Raymond — Not Interested

Coe-Brown — Ruled out because as a Semi-Private School, State aid could not be received toward tuition by the town of Nottingham. Also they have no facilities to handle Junior High Students.

Rochester — Interested

Oyster River — Interested

Dover — Interested

Of the interested school districts, tuition costs would be based on current yearly per pupil cost for each student, plus a building rental charge of two percent.

After inspecting the facilities of the interested School Districts, the Nottingham School Board would like to make the following comments:

Rochester — Has currently signed agreements with several towns, but due to space problems it seems likely a double session would be necessary to meet their present commitments until a new High School is built.

Oyster River — With their new addition would be able to handle our students, Grades 9-12, but definitely would not be able to take Grades 7 and 8 until a new Elementary School is built.

Dover — Is currently interested and has the present capacity to handle our students, Grades 7-12. As far as Physical Plant and facilities, we feel Dover is by far the most up to date and best equipped School System we visited.

It is the recommendation of the Nottingham School Board that this School District Meeting appoint an Area School Planning Committee, to meet and work out details with the Dover School Board in establishing an area school agreement to accept our students, grades 7-12.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The health program for the year, 1968-69, was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. When defects were noted, the appropriate referral and follow-up were made.

The Heaf Test for tuberculosis was offered in each school to the first and second grade students. A total of 324 children were tested, and 4 also received the Mantoux Test.

The students of Epsom, Northwood, and Strafford again received the benefit of preventive dental care through programs sponsored by the N.H. Bureau of Dental Public Health and one or more local organizations. Barrington, Epsom, and Northwood schools also provided corrective dental treatment through The Matching Funds Program.

142 children were registered for first grade at Preschool Clinics held in April and May. Mrs. Norma Keeler of Epsom again offered her services at these clinics, and her help was greatly appreciated by all.

The ever increasing school population has had its effect on the health program, as well as elsewhere, raising the case load to well over 1,000 students for one nurse. The recommendation of the N.H. State Board of Education is for a maximum case load not to exceed 750 pupils per nurse; and, ideally, a full-time nurse for every 350 students.

I would like to express my sincere appreciation to Mr. Martineau, Mr. Morgan, School Board Members, teachers and parents for their cooperation and support during the past year.

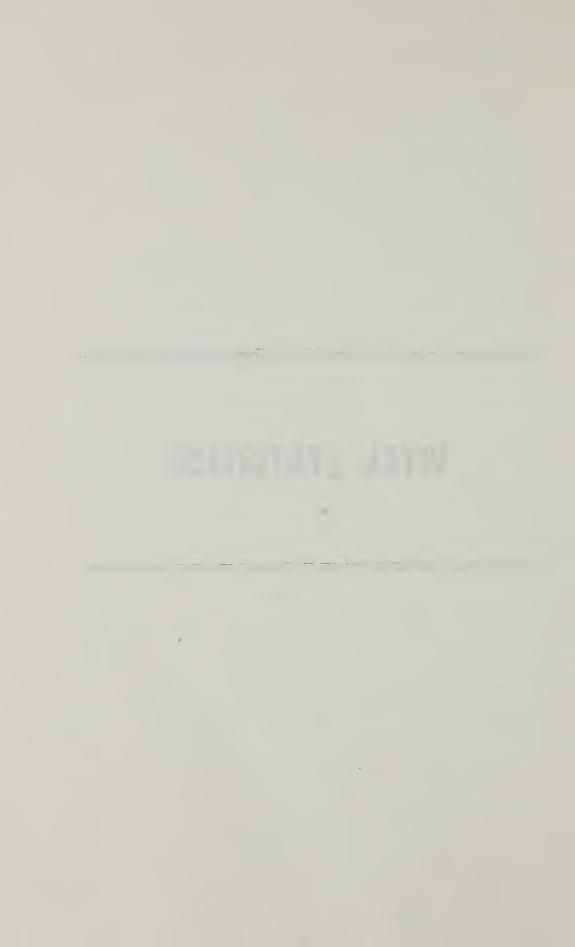
